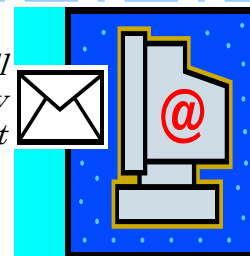

I found a book in your catalog, but where the call number should have been, it just said "netLibrary eBook." How do I get the book? And when did we start putting capital letters in the middle of words?

Dear Ms. Missing:

We have over 14,500 *netLibrary* eBooks in our collection. When you find one in the catalog, click the URL under Link to the Web Version, and log in with your Webster ID#.

Like a print book, only one person can use the book at a time, so you set up an account (which is very easy) with the link on the page, and then check out the book. The check out period is usually four hours. If you need more time and no one else wants the book, just check it out again.

Like a print book, you can see the book cover, title page, table of contents, etc.—the whole book! Unlike print books, you can search for keywords in the full text of *netLibrary* eBooks—either a single book or all of *netLibrary* as a database. To search *netLibrary*, simply go to the library homepage, select [Online/Fulltext Databases](#), and from [Databases A-Z](#), choose *netLibrary*.

As to the changes in the capitalization rules, check out a good citation guide such as APA or MLA, and we'll help you look it up.

You can browse more than 4,200 full-text magazines, journals, and newspapers and find citations for nearly twice that many titles, often going back more than 20 years from 1980 to present. *InfoTrac OneFile* provides great coverage of current events, the arts and humanities, business, social and general sciences.
