As true believers in the American system, it is our duty to voice our strong objections to your widening the war by sending American troops into Cambodia .. This is in direct contradiction to your recently stated intention to lessen our involvement in Southeast Asia.. As loyal Americans, we insist that you heed the advice of the majority of the Senate and immediately desist from this unstatesmanlike, illegal and unAmerican action... Our friends and representatives of our strong feelings and shall carefully watch their actions and yours..
